Our study area is the Madison Street Corridor in the greater Garfield Park area. The Corridor runs from Madison and Rockwell on the east to Madison and Kenton on the west. This corridor cuts across East Garfield Park and West Garfield Park. These are all city streets. There are numerous public transit services within the area, with buses that run east-west along Madison, buses on north-south crossing streets (Pulaski, Cicero, California, Homan, and Kedzie) and the CTA Green Line and Blue Line just blocks away and serving both East Garfield Park and West Garfield Park.

The attached map shows the relevant Madison Street corridor in bright blue.

Note that we believe work on the Madison Street corridor will impact the whole neighborhood, including for example, the Pulaski and Jackson Street Corridors as well as side neighborhood streets.

If yes, please list the name of the plan(s) In 2022, we completed the West Garfield Park Corridors Plan. https://acrobat.adobe.com/id/urn:aaid:sc:US:d09c6d0f-0eed-4fe0-b516-3b5 c40131bd8. We note that this plan focused only on the West Garfield Park area of Madison and Pulaski Streets. We would like to build off of this plan and incorporate it in a larger quality of life plan that will cover the full corridor and fully reflect the priorities of the community.

What is the goal of this plan? What are you looking to accomplish?

There has been a great deal of planning and discussion in the Garfield Park community over the last several years. We have done a corridor plan specifically for West Garfield Park, focusing largely (though not exclusively) on commercial elements. We are in the planning and early execution stage of the exciting Sankofa Wellness Village, which will bring a community health center, arts and advocacy center, and entrepreneurship hub to West Garfield Park. We are in the process of engaging community in asset-mapping and issue identification to create a full Quality of Life Plan (QLP) that encompasses all of East and West Garfield Park and all of the issues that concern our community. LISC is working with in partnership on the community engagement process.

We need technical assistance to take us from community engagement to creation of our QLP, specifically making sure that the existing Corridor Plan, Sankofa Wellness Village plans and the views of the community from our community engagement work are fully integrated into a final comprehensive QLP. Our goal is to complete the QLP by the end of 2024 so we can start raising funds and executing on the plan in 2025.

We are working collaboratively with many entities, are engaged in numerous intiatives, and have increasing interest from the City and private philanthropies. But we would benefit from your technical assistance to get a holistic and integrated QLP to the finish line so we can use it to make positive impact throughout our community in the years to come.

Describe your coordination when developing this application with the roadway agency and other municipalities located along the corridor:

Since inception, the Collaborative has worked closely with the City of Chicago as well as Alderman Ervin and Alderman Burnett to start addressing the decades of disinvestment and challenges of Garfield Park. Indeed, our first major initiative, turning an open-air drug market at Madison and Hamlin into a Community Plaza and Skate Park, was done in partnership with the City of Chicago. For the last two years, we have had an embedded staff person from the City's Community Safety Coordinating Center (CSCC), one of only a few communities to be part of this pilot program to address violence prevention at the block-by-block level. Recently, the Mayor chose our community as one of four to focus on for investment of resources to address violence and improve community safety. The City and Aldermen have supported our work with Sankofa Wellness Village as well. Our strong relationship with the City of Chicago will make our Quality of Life Planning project all the more impactful.

## If yes, please describe:

Both East and West Garfield Park have been victim of decades of disinvestment and their populations are historically disadvantaged. Both community areas are majority Black -- 85% for East Garfield Park (EGP) and 92% for West Garfield Park (WGP). Education levels are low. 21% of EGP adults and 25% of WGP adults have no high school diploma, compared to 14% for the City overall. Only 18% of EGP adults and 10% of WGP adults have any kind of college degree (compared with 30% for the City). Income levels are low -- in EGP 52% of households have income under \$25,000 and 74% have income under \$50,000. In WGP, those figures are 46% and 70% respectively. This is compared to city wide figures of 23% under \$25,000 and 42% under \$50,000. Unemployment is high compared to the city overall. In EGP, 19% of labor force participants are unemployed and in WGP, 24% are unemployed, compared to a city wide figure of 8%. West Garfield Park is widely recognized as one of the communities suffering significant gun violence; substance abuse is rampant.

We are excited about the progress we've made but will need so much more help -- and many years -- to overcome the historic and systemic problems that plague East and West Garfield Park. Technical assistance to complete out Quality of Life Planning process is an important step toward what we anticipate will be many years of activism and action to achieve our vision of a safe and healthy community.
