(250-350 words):	This project initiates Phase II Design Engineering and Construction to secure grant funds for detailed planning and actual construction for a crucial connection between open space, economic opportunities, and transit. Phase II Design Engineering will encompass tasks like shared-use path installation, crosswalk enhancements, ditch grading, and more. The completed multi-use path will connect the Eastgate neighborhood to
	the Village Downtown, integrating it with the existing network inaccessible to residents north of 26th Street and east of Western Avenue. This will also help connect residents to Thorn Creek Trail and Old Plank Trail users, enhancing access to the Forest Preserve and connections to Downtown Park Forest.
	The application extends the path from Norwood Boulevard, crossing Western Avenue, and connecting to Thorn Creek Trail. It's essential for a needy neighborhood and a crucial connection to open space and economic opportunities.

2. Please describe how this project will help to increase transit ridership and make transit more accessible to riders. Please include the specific bus routes, bus stops, or train stations that will be impacted by the improvement(s). (200-300 words):

This project will seek to continue the work of Cook County Invest in Cook funded Phase I Preliminary Engineering to complete a critical connection from open space and commerce to a neighborhood in need. The project scope includes all Phase II Design Engineering and Construction for a multi-use path along a utility right-of-way (ROW) north of 26th Street. This path would connect the Eastgate neighborhood with DownTown retail options and open space of Sauk Trail Woods and provide much better access to Pace Bus Route 366. The estimated work to be completed in the Phase II Design and Construction for the multi-use path would encompass detailed planning and actual construction activities to establish a vital connection between open space and a needy neighborhood, including shared-use path installation, crosswalk enhancements, ditch grading, traffic signal modifications, and parkway restoration.

The Village anticipates a multitude of benefits as a result of this project and the follow-on project being completed. The final construction of the multi-use path will connect the Eastgate neighborhood to the Village DownTown and rest of the Village through the rest of the Village's bike and pedestrian network, which is currently cut off from all residents north of 26th Street and east of Western Avenue. Additionally, many recreational options will be made available - not only to the residents of Eastgate neighborhood - but also to patrons of the Thorn Creek Trail and the Old Plank Trail which circumvents this part of Park Forest. Currently, Thorn Creek Trail connects to the sidewalk at Allegheny Street, but biking infrastructure becomes inadequate. This improvement would allow for pedestrians and bicyclists to make their way towards retail opportunities from Thorn Creek Trail to DownTown Park Forest; strengthening amenities for the trail and increasing clientele DownTown Park Forest.

This project was conceived in 2008 with the adoption of the Village of Park Forest's Comprehensive Plan: Strategic Plan for Land Use and Economic Development. The Village's comprehensive plan included the following implementation strategy for the Eastgate neighborhood, "capitalize on the electric utility right-of-way and forest preserve land to build a multi-use trail along 26th Street to Western Avenue." (Page EN-4, Strategic Plan for Land Use and Economic Development). During fiscal year 2022, the Forest Preserve of Cook County is implemented projects at Sauk Trail Woods and developed engagement opportunities for the region to better utilize the green infrastructure. Additionally the Village of Park Forest currently has a separate multi-use path approved for construction through IDOT ITEP funds, which will be constructed along Forest Boulevard from the Village's DownTown to Norwood Boulevard.

This application will extend the planned multi-use path from Norwood Boulevard, run east down 26th Street where it will cross Western Avenue at the signalized intersection, and continue east on 26th Street where it will connect to Thorn Creek Trail. This project will provide the Village with funds to implement a critical multi-use path for a neighborhood in need and a essential connection from open space and economic opportunity.

Project Summary

The Village of Park Forest is applying for RTA Access to Transit Funds for Phase II Design and Construction of a Multi-Use Path along 26th Street.
